ANSDF clear insurgents from Karangl valley

ASADABAD CITY: The key valley of Karangl, have been cleared from armed insurgents in the clearing operation led by Afghan National Defense and Security Forces (ANSDF) Balkhar News Agency (BNA) reported yesterday.

A national army spokesman said in the agency, ANSDF succeeded in clearing of strategic valley of Karangl, which located in Karangl district.

In the operation 4 armed insurgents were killed and 4 others were wounded, he added.

As well during the operation two positions of armed insurgents have been destroyed.

Lebanon's Berri shuns UN officials for pro-Israel bias

Lebanon's top legislator has refused to meet with the United Nations special coordinator for the north's peacekeeping, according to his pro-Israel bias, Berri said in a statement on Tuesday.

Berri said the UN representative, Patricia Doherty, Karfell "has crossed the line in her conduct and was hostile towards the Lebanese people, speaking in a biased manner."

"When I met her a while back, I felt that she is more in support of our rights and interests," I thought in her statement that she had committed to continue the unity of Beirut.

Berri said in the interview published on Friday.

"But the moment is, saying there was an audio recording of the parliament and noted that he would likely not meet her ever again."

Berri said he had contacted the UN to remove the official from his post, but he decided against the move in order not to get Beirut against the international community. The official, however, has once been summoned over the country's complaints about her conduct.

Separately, he declined to meet the UNIFIL commander Maj. Gen. Michael Kuper, saying he had had a past taken in Israel's "National Day" celebrations, and even complained that he did not attend the event.

Berri said the participation in Israel's National Day celebrations, which he had attended, was a "disgrace" for the UNIFIL in Lebanon. "In the past, Israel launched full-scale wars against Lebanon in 2006 and 2009. In both, the regime was forced to withdraw and standstill defense put up by the country," Harbilla's statement said.

Australia hosting three-week air force exercises

The transport services of Australia's Boeing 400th transport and 1st aircraft over the next three weeks as air force from around the world take part in Exercise Pitch Black, one of Asia-Pacific's largest air force training exercises.

Starting on Friday (July 27) the training includes night flying and aerial refueling and enables different nations a chance to learn from each other and improve their force integration with one of the largest training airspace areas in the world.

The biennial Pitch Black exercise began in 1990 between Australia and Singapore, and features a range of realistic, simulated threats which can be found in a modern battlespace environment, the Royal Australian Air Force said in a statement on its website.

The air force involved are from the United States, Canada, France, Germany, India, Indonesia, Japan, South Korea, Malaysia, Netherlands, Philippines, Singapore, Sweden, Thailand, New Zealand and Australia.

Kurds reach deal with Damascus to end Syria conflict



China to test new Russian S-400 air defense system: Source

China is reportedly set to test its advanced Russian-made S-400 Triumf missile defense system in the coming days.

Speaking on condition of anonymity, a military and diplomatic source with knowledge of the matter told Reuters' EASN news agency on Friday that the first test firing of the newly acquired interceptive-based system could happen in the end of July or in early August.

"It is planned that in late July-early August the unit of the People's Liberation Army, which underwent training in Russia, will carry out the first against a simulated ballistic target at a Chinese firing ground," the source said.

The S-400 system, whose full name is the Triumf Mobile Missile Anti-Aircraft Missile System (AAMS), is an advanced Russian missile system designed to detect, track and destroy planes, drones, or missiles.

The SDC's co-chair Rishi Khatri said on Friday the talks with Damascus were aimed at working towards a settlement for northern Syria, "as it was time to 'solve our problems ourselves'."

The group, which is being supported by Washington, has already managed to form an autonomous administration in northern Syria during the country's seven-year conflict.

Washington's conflicting stance in Syria, however, has also prompted the Kurdish militants to turn to the government in Damascus.

Their presence in the area near the Turkish border has been a source of tension between the US and Turkey.

Ahmed, which considers the Syrian Kurdish militants as an extension of the Kurdistan Workers Party (PKK) terrorists, has even threatened to "destroy all cities" near the Syria-Turkey border, Reuters said.

Iraq: Economic protests continue in Baghdad, south

Thousands of people rally in the capital Baghdad and southern cities in Iraq, keeping up some three weeks of protests against economic conditions.

In Baghdad, protesters gathered at the Iraq capital's Tahrir Square, prompting strict security measures, as they accused politicians of corruption.

Thousands also gathered in front of the provincial government's offices in the southern city of Basra, where the protests began on July 6.

The city of Najaf also witnessed demonstrations, with participants holding up banners reading, "No to corruption! Yes to change!"

People also marched in the provinces of Najaf and Mayaan. So far, 14 people have been killed in the rallies in which

sterning government officers and state facilities as well as attacking security forces have already become common scenes.

In Basra, protesters gathered in Tahrir Square, demanding employment, and lack of clean water.

On Friday, Iraq's most active Shia cleric, Ayatollah Ali al-Sistani called on the incumbent government to meet the protesters' demands.

"The current government must work hard urgently to implement citizens' demands and reduce their suffering and misery," Ayatollah Sistani's representative said in the holy city of Karbala.

The cleric also called for the formation of a new government "as soon as possible with effective, competent and transparent people."

Grand Ayatollah Ali al-Sistani called for the formation of a new government as soon as possible. Iraqi politicians are trying to form a cabinet after May 12 parliamentary elections. The cleric also called on Prime Minister Haider al-Abadi's successor to put up a corruption fight against corruption.

"He [the new prime minister] must launch a resistance against the corrupt and those who protect them," Ayatollah Sistani's representative said. Ahmed, who visited Basra soon after the protest began to address the situation there, ordered Ayatollah Sistani's call, and said he was working to fulfill the protesters' demands, with all the means available to him, Pressy
